



Myron Cooper Patrick

Services for Myron Cooper Patrick, 70, Lexington, will be held Thursday, 11a.m. at LeCompte-Johnson-Taylor. Burial will follow at Frankfort Cemetery. Rev. Billy Ray Jennings and Rev. Larry Bruce Hall will officiate.

Mr. Patrick died February 26, at Homestead Nursing Center in Lexington. A native of Frankfort, he was the son of the late Olney Morton and Virginia McCoy Patrick.

Myron was a graduate of Bridgeport High School, Georgetown College and UK School of Pharmacy. He was member of Kappa Alpha fraternity, KY Pharmacist Association and First United Methodist Church, Frankfort. He was the first recipient of the Loudon & Co. Celebrated Citizen Award at Homestead Nursing Center.

He was well respected in the Frankfort Community as a small businessman and health care professional. He provided medical counsel and support to his customers through his caring, positive, professional bedside manner. He was the hospital pharmacist at Kings Daughter's Hospital and voluntary UK College of Pharmacy Clinical Instructor until 1976, when he opened his first business, Cardwell Drug Store. He later built and managed Physicians Park Pharmacy and Home Oxygen Therapy. He was very generous, providing supplies and equipment to anyone who came to him, regardless of their ability to pay. He made a difference in the lives of hundreds of people. He always enjoyed the outdoors and was an avid hunter, fisherman, gardener and cattle farmer. In 1988, he suffered a massive cerebral hemorrhage and was forced to retire.

He is survived by three daughters, Virginia Patrick Smith (Ted), Salt lake City, UT, Susan Patrick Smith (Lance), Lexington and Lisa Carol Mitchell, Frankfort; one brother, Dr. O. M. Patrick (Mary Leigh), Frankfort; seven grandchildren, Christy Delliskave (Nick), Jonathan Leake, Betsy, Patrick and Daniel Banks, Lucas and Tori Smith; one great-grandson, Dominic Delliskave.
