Services for Dr. J. Hill Hamon, Sr., 78, will be held 1 p.m. Wednesday at LeCompte-Johnson-Taylor Funeral Home. Visitation will be held Tuesday 4-8 p.m. at the funeral home.

He passed away Saturday May 8 at the Markey Cancer Center. His wife, Elizabeth (Libby) Cox Hamon survives. He was the son of James and Elizabeth Hamon of Danville, Ky.

He served in the Navy as a fighter pilot. He attended the EKV, masters at UK and PhD at the University of Florida in avian paleontology. His first faculty appointment was at Indiana State University until 1968 when he came to Transylvania University in Lexington. He taught there until 1995 when he retired.

He was a biologist, a photographer, a printer, a papermaker, a calligrapher, a musician, a geologist, a writer, and above all a lively and concerned teacher. He became nationally known for his work as a miniature bookmaker, distinguished for their beauty of graphic design and perfect execution. He became a private press printer at his own Whippoorwill Press.

Hamon, a keyboard enthusiast, shared his special interest in the work of Beethoven, Schubert, and other composers through occasional public recitals, both solo performances and in duets with colleagues and students. Another love of his was photography including black and white darkroom and digital. In addition to his wife Libby, he is survived by three children, David, Lexington

Ky., Deborah of Frankfort and J. Hill Hamon, Jr., (Ruth Ann) – also of Frankfort; and 2 grand daughters, Kristy and Lainey.
